## Shane Fitzsimmons *Commissioner of Resilience NSW*

The following summary of Shane's talk at the District Conference has been reproduced from the Port Macquarie SUNRISE Rotary bulletin. 17/3/21

Shane Fitzsimmons spoke of his pride in volunteers. Australia has

over 300,000 volunteers who work selflessly with a professional approach. He described the plight of Australian volunteer fire fighters who assisted in the US and Canadian fires. Firefighters in these countries are paid which led to a dilemma in sending

Australian volunteer firefighters - Solution - a stipend was given to our volunteers so that they could enter the firegrounds.

He also spoke of the mental health challenges which continue to be at the heart of rebuilding communities after the unprecedented fire season. These challenges will continue for months and years. We all need to keep our eyes and ears open for opportunities to help affected areas to heal. The Government cannot build resilience, but communities together can.

NSW stepped up as a state, as 'doing nothing' was not an option. Shane offered some key strategies for leadership success by which he lives -

• Be authentic - *Don't give people a 'dog poo sandwich' and tell them it's fairy bread!* 

• Leaders must lead for others - Don't take yourself seriously but take the role seriously.

 Mutual respect for all - we come from different backgrounds - *Manners cost you nothing but lack of them costs you everything*.

• Communication - need to be authentic - If you don't know,
