

Reg Pierce has been running a series of stories in the Wauchope Rotary Club Bulletin on Famous Rotarians. Here is one inspiring story -

Clarence Birdseye

Rotary Club of Rochester, Minnesota

The sixth of nine children born to Ada Jane Underwood and lawyer Clarence Frank Birdseye, Clarence Birdseye entered the word by way of Brooklyn, New York on December 9, 1886. A boy fascinated by natural science and taxidermy, his knowledge in these areas would be enhanced by correspondence courses. He would go on to study science at Amherst, but later drop out for financial reasons.




To support himself, he joined scientific expeditions, one of which took him to Labrador to work in the fur business. It was here that he began his food-freezing experiments with whatever fresh food was available. He ate fried rattlesnake slices in pork fat, lynx marinated in sherry, fresh porcupine, polar bear meat and skunk. Birdseye's ultimate commercial success got its start with the knowledge gained from the Inuit, who taught him to fish trout from holes in the ice, which would freeze instantly in the air, which registered at 30 degrees below zero. But when it was cooked, the fish tasted like fresh trout. It was the same with the meat and game, which the Inuit kept fresh for months in hard-packed snow.

Returning to the states, Birdseye experimented until he'd invented a marketable freezing machine, which could freeze food very quickly at low temperatures, while retaining a reasonably fresh taste and texture. His first mass marketing was of frozen fish, which had limited success. The core marketing dilemma was that most markets and homes were not yet set up to store frozen food in large volume. Most people were still using ice boxes. This would change following WWII.


In the meantime, Birdseye sold his company to Post for \$22 million (approx. \$365 million in 2022 dollars). Birdseye died in 1956 at the age of 69. He was cremated, and his ashes were scattered in the ocean off the coast of Gloucester, Massachusetts.

<u>Reg states</u> - I've been running these "Notable Rotarians" pieces for a few weeks now because I wanted to show how some very busy people still had time to give of themselves through Rotary. They include Prime Ministers, Royalty, inventors & business tycoons. But they all had compassion & empathy for those less fortunate.
