Tonight's speaker was Ross Nancarrow—Every Daughter Matters



Ross is a pastor and the Chief Executive Director of Every Daughter Matters. Ross and his organisation is committed to rescuing Nepal's daughters from human trafficking. In 2015 Ross set out to facilitate the establishment of 250 new churches in Nepal, including seeing each church become sift sufficient and mature. In 2020 he achieved his goal, He was instrumental in the establishment of an antitrafficking organisation with capacity to interrupt and ultimately eradicate the trafficking of women and girls from Nepal into India. Ross

women and girls from Nepal into India. Ross says that "As a CEO, I have broad experience with internationally disadvantaged peoples. Each role and experience I've had has served to build up, encourage and mobilise people for good.

Educating them about the risks see them in turn educate others and this is how we break the cycles that have kept generations of women at risk of being sold into slavery. After many years involved with international disadvantaged peoples, I have a clear sense of convergence of my skill set as teacher, mobiliser, leadership trainer, team's coordinator, and organisational developer. I love speaking up for those who cannot speak for themselves, and advocate for the rights of those who are disadvantaged or victims of slavery or human trafficking. It is estimated that there are over 40 million people in slavery around the world today. Human trafficking is a thriving business. It accounts for \$150 billion a year world-wide with women and girls making up to 71% of all modern slavery victims. Every daughter is PRICELESS and is deserving of respect, dignity and value. The organisation is committed to Seeing the trade of young Nepali women and girls across the border into India interrupted and ultimately eradicated. Their plan is INTERCEPTION! A powerful, productive and life-changing weapon in the fight against trafficking!

Rescuing Nepal's Daughters—Nearly 1.5 million Nepalis are at risk of various forms of Human Trafficking says the country's National Human Right's Commission as reported in the Kathmandu Post in March 2020. Nepali girls are especially desirable as prostitutes in India because they are consid-

ered more attractive due to their lighter skin colour, and because Nepali virgins are believed to be able to cure AIDS and other diseases.

Trafficking in Nepal—The 1,758 kilometre border between Nepal and India has always been known as one of the busiest human trafficking gateways in the world. Nepalese victims are plunged into the world of human trafficking in different ways. Many hope to find jobs as domestic workers in India or Gulf countries but end up being trafficked and raped in brothels abroad. Others find themselves working in



sweat shops, circuses or on construction sites in bonded labour. Many others fall prey to one of the most horrific forms of trafficking – organ harvesting.
