Tonight's guest speaker was Dustin Wellbourne, Ph.D who spoke about the global and local impact of invasive species and touched on his new co-written book called

INVASIVE SPECIES: A very short introduction

According to the National Geographic, an invasive species is an organism that is not indigenous, or native, to a particular area. Invasive species can cause great economic and environmental harm. Dustin showed us how species can invade often without

us knowing until great harm is done. He gave us a picture of global airways and shipping lanes around the world which showed a means of transportation. An example he highlighted was the brown tree snake that was introduced to the island of Guam. A soundscape of Guam and its neighbouring island Sinapalo showed that Sinapalo forests still rang with the sound of many birds and creatures, whilst Guam

was silent. Guam's 12 forest birds were especially impacted, with 10 species eliminated and the other two severely reduced. Dustin spoke about the fisherman in the Black Sea who lost their livelihood of catching

livelihood of catching anchovies when they were severely impacted by Phylloxera. In Australia we have seen the impact of feral horses, deer, rabbits, wild dogs, cats, cane toads. The environmental, financial and human impact comes at an enormous cost.



Today there is no place on Earth that does not harbour invasive exotic species. Invasive plants and animals can be found on every continent including Antarctica, and within all waterbodies

every continent, including Antarctica, and within all waterbodies, including all oceans. In our increasingly connected world, with speedy commercial and recreational travel and the global movement of biological matter for food, invasive species are showing up at such a fast rate that there is no way to accurately count how many currently exist or how many are likely to emerge in the coming decades. Monitoring these species and controlling their spread is essential, as we increasingly understand the negative impacts they pose: their threat to our health; the toll they take on our commercial production; and the threat they pose to native ecosystems. This Very Short Introduction provides a clear definition of an invasive species, and considers the myriad ways they are moved

around the globe, and the ecological, social, and economic impacts they often impose. (www.amazon.co.uk)


